A Letter from Our Executive Director

Dear Friends,

2026 marks the 250th anniversary of the birth of the United States, and 190 years of Turning Points for Children and its legacy organizations serving the Philadelphia community. **For almost as long as this country has existed, we have been caring for children and families.** This year, as we honor both our organization's long history as well as that of our country and Philadelphia's key role in it, we are reminded that our work is built on generations of care, innovation, and perseverance. That legacy was unmistakably evident across our programs this year.

As the challenges facing our communities continue to cause uncertainty in our work, Turning Points continues to show up. In moments like those of the SNAP pause, when there was great uncertainty for many of our households, our families knew they could rely on our FAWN pantries. At the same time, BIPS, one of our older youth support programs, earned a 100% score on its city audit, an exceptional and rare achievement that reflects a team going above and beyond for the young people of West Philly. Our programs have continued to support at-risk children and youth; like LifeSet, an evidenced based program that walks alongside youth exiting the foster care system, and ReUp215, our diversion program which works with youth at risk of involvement in the delinquent system.

These programs reflect both who we have always been and who we continue to strive to be an organization grounded in history, responsive in the present, and committed to a stronger future for youth and families. Thank you for standing with us and believing in the power of prevention, partnership, and possibility. We are proud of what we have accomplished together and look forward to the work ahead.

Older Youth Services

From Prevention To Possibility: BIPS

BIPS (Bridge Intensive Prevention Services) is designed to support youth with complex needs by providing early, targeted interventions that prevent deeper child welfare involvement. Our BIPS staff build consistent, trusting relationships with the youth, ensuring each participant receives frequent, meaningful engagement, trauma informed, culturally responsive care, and family case management that extends beyond crisis stabilization.

In a recent DHS audit, BIPS scored 100%. This accomplishment demonstrates not only full compliance with DHS standards but also the strength, dedication, and professionalism of our team. It confirms that our work is having significant impact on the well-being of the youth in our program.

ReUp215: Not Giving Up

ReUp215 works with youth who are currently or have previously been involved in the juvenile justice system, lack significant family support, and need additional academic and housing resources. The program seeks to reduce the number of young people in the juvenile justice system, set them on a path to complete education, remain free of further criminal charges, and prepare them for life post-high school. ReUp215 connects each youth with a Diversion Coach to set and guide the youth through their personal goals, and the program is a partnership with the Philadelphia District Attorney's office.

Family Support Services

Stenghtening Families One Meal at a Time: FAWN

FAWN (Food and Wellness Network) has been a reliable source of nutritious food for families in need of basic necessities. FAWN is more than a food pantry, it promotes nutrition, case management, and wellness through monthly workshops and community partnerships.

Families that visit FAWN have access to support to get them through challenging times. When SNAP benefits were paused temporarily, FAWN had a notable increase of new families coming to the pantry and also many more community partners stepping up to help meet the surge in demand.

A Small Team with a Big Impact: Family Finding

The Philadelphia-based Family Finding program connects each child with a network of supportive individuals, fosters a sense of belonging for youth, and develops permanent relationships which build resilience for youth in or at-risk of being in foster care. The goal is to locate at least 40 people for each child that will become lifelong connections. With support of Family Finding, the risk of incarceration, mental and physical health challenges, and homelessness in adulthood is reduced.




Financials

Total Annual Budget for 2025: \$30,794,000


Sources of Revenue
